- 1913 Designed and built a teahouse at his home. (The teahouse was moved in 1969 to the grounds of the Yoshikawa Hachimangu Shrine, which is next to the Mirei Shigemori Memorial Hall on the southeast side.)
- 1919 Graduated from the Nihonbijutsu Training School
- 1923 Graduated from Toyo University
- 1925 Adopted the professional name Mirei
- 1929 Moved to Kyoto
- 1932 Established Kyoto Rinsen Kyokai
- 1933 Published Kvoto Bijutsu Tajkan Tejen Hen (Survey of the Arts of Kyoto - Garden Volume)
- 1936 Published Nihon Teienshi Zukan(Guide to Japanese Garden History)(1936~1939)
- 1939 Completed the Hojo Garden for the abbot's hall and the Komyo-in Garden at Tofuku-ji temple in Kyoto
- 1969 Completed the Yurin Garden in the courtyard of the Kyoto Yuzen Cooperative Association showroom (moved to Kayo Branch, Kibichuo Town Hall in 2002)
- 1971 Published Jissokuzu Nihon no Meien (Measured Maps of Famous Japanese Gardens) Published Nihon Teienshi Taikei (A Scheme of Japanese Garden History)*
- 1972 Completed the Shusekitei Garden at Hokoku Shrine in Osaka, and a garden at Kanyo-ji temple in Yamaguchi Prefecture
- 1973 Published Chashitsu Chatei Jiten (Dictionary of Tea Rooms and Tea Gardens)
- 1975 Completed a garden at Matsuo Taisha shrine in Kyoto.

Born in 1896 and died in 1975 Born in Yoshikawa Village, Joho County (currently Yoshikawa, Kibichuo Town), Okavama Prefecture Shigemori was a leading landscape architect of the Showa Period (1926-1989) who created unique Japanese gardens.

A master of traditional arts including tea ceremony and flower arrangement, he contributed enormously to the world of Japanese landscape gardens as a garden history researcher.



Ogura Residence

Created in 1951 at the Ogura residence, the Kvokuto-tei garden is a horai-shinsen design, an elaboration of the shinsen style. It

contains three stone groups, each surrounded by a bed of juniper haircap moss. Viewed from the shoin building, at the rear is a horai group representing a mythical mountain with eight stones. Before it to the left is the hojo group with seven stones, and to the right is the eiju group. The three groups represent, respectively, the shin, gyo and so elements of a classic garden, arranged in a new style as an expression of the worldview of mountain-dwelling immortals (horai shinsen). The overall form of the garden has an odd resemblance to a bonsai-style tray landscape.

This was Shigemori's debut work, created in 1913 when he was 18 years old, and was moved in 1969 to the grounds of the Yoshikawa Hachimangu Shrine, which is next to the Mirei Shigemori Memorial Hall on the southeast.

In the tea garden that was created at the time of the relocation, the tea room was

built and colored cement set in the ground, creating an abstract design evoking a sea and mountains, which was the first time to try this.
